In Surrey alone, we work with 60 schools to provide 950 weekend food bags each week.

Kam Grewal, principal at Forsyth Road Elementary, began her role at the North Surrey school four years ago. Sometimes she'd go to Costco to buy food for students with her own money to make sure they ate over long weekends or spring break.

"When I first got here, I really saw the impact Backpack Buddies was having," she says. Since she started, the number of families receiving weekend support has grown from around 30 to 45, as both the cost of living and the population in North Surrey grow.

Many kids in the program at Forsyth Road are recent refugees to Canada whose families often struggle with the high costs of food, unfamiliar stores and products, language barriers, navigating cities without a vehicle, and overcoming trauma.

Yet even families who have been in Canada for generations are still struggling with the high cost of living, Kam notes.

She recalls one family with six children who has had at least one student in the school for over a decade. The cost of food can skyrocket in families with multiple children.

"These families are absolutely facing food insecurity. We can help them with breakfast and lunch," she notes, "but Backpack Buddies is crucial for these families to have something to take home over the weekend."

Our partnerships with B.C. schools are critical to our collaborative approach to feeding hungry kids. Backpack Buddies is coordinated through teachers, administrators, and social workers, like Hailey MacIsaac, Forsyth Road's Child and Youth Care Worker.

When she started at Forsyth Road two years ago, the kids came to her to explain how Backpack Buddies worked—they couldn't wait to get their next bag.

"The kids themselves want it, and are advocating for it. It's a little treat for them to see what's in the bag." She notes that pepperoni sticks and seaweed snacks are particular favorites this year.

As a care worker, she has seen firsthand how hunger negatively affects children. They can become easily upset, have low energy, and have a hard time concentrating.

"When a kid is fed, it changes their whole behavior and their energy," Hailey says.

In addition to putting food on their students' tables, both Kam and Hailey see another benefit to Backpack Buddies: it shows their students that the community cares about them.

"It's so important for them to know that there are people in the community who see them, understand their challenges and are willing to take action," said Kam. "Our kids need to see those kinds of positives in the world."

## Celebrating 8 Years of Partnership With Free Yumm!

Just like Backpack Buddies, FreeYumm started with a local mom named Sarah who saw a gap in her community and took action. When her son was diagnosed with multiple food allergies, Sarah was disheartened by the lack of food sensitive snack products—so she started creating her own!

FreeYumm teamed up with Backpack Buddies to help reach vulnerable communities regardless of their dietary needs or family circumstances. "We strongly believe that every child deserves access to nutritious and wholesome food, which is why we partner with



Backpack Buddies to help address hunger and ensure kids can focus on what matters most—their education and well-being," says Sarah.

For eight years, FreeYumm has generously donated snack bars, supporting children every month. We're so grateful to work alongside them, keeping kids from going hungry on weekends!
